

*Voluntary Action North Lincolnshire* is a Charitable Company governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association adopted on 19th March 1997. The date of Incorporation was 1st April 1997. Its purposes are the advancement of education, the protection of health and the relief of poverty, distress and sickness. These aims are pursued by bringing together voluntary and statutory organisations in Council and by encouraging co-operation between organisations.

The policy and general management of the affairs of *Voluntary Action* are directed by a Board of Trustees. The members of the Board of Trustees are Directors of the Company and elected to serve for three years or co-opted annually.

# Our Aims and Purposes

Although **Voluntary Action North Lincolnshire** is a new organisation that has been offering services only since 1st April 1997, it has taken over the work of the Councils for Voluntary Service that used to cover Scunthorpe, the old Glanford area and the Isle of Axholme. Voluntary organisations anywhere in North Lincolnshire should now be able to access the same services to the same standard.

The charitable purposes of our organisation (advancement of education, protection of health and relief of poverty, distress and sickness) are carried out in a particular way. We aim to support and bring together organisations that share our aims and to encourage co-operation.

There are four themes to our general activity:

- **Service Provision** to voluntary organisations and community groups.  
This can include office services, use of rooms and equipment, advice on charitable and organisational matters, an information service, training or coaching and regular news letters. The aim of this support is to enable groups who share our purposes to function more effectively.
- **Liaison** with statutory organisations, national bodies and major voluntary organisations.  
This process aims to enable information about local needs to be discussed and shared, information about services to be passed on to local people and links and networks to be created.
- **Representation** of local views and needs about service provision.  
We seek to help local people to respond to consultation exercises about services they use and to take part in the planning process.
- **Development** of new and appropriate services.  
We help new groups to form and set up in response to perceived need; we also assess need and when no other appropriate organisation is available to do so, set up pilot projects.



Because North Lincolnshire is a mixed rural and urban area with half the population living in small communities spread over a wide area, we have to think carefully about how to make it easy for people to gain access to our services. In addition to our centrally-based office in Scunthorpe we also offer help from part-time resource bases in Barton, Brigg, Crowle, Epworth and Winterton. Staff will visit groups on occasion and we rely heavily on the telephone. We are looking at ways we can make our services more accessible for people with various kinds of disability.

# Progress

In reviewing our first year's work the Board of Trustees must consider:

- was a balance achieved between basic service provision and new development?
- did our work reflect our purposes?
- were Members satisfied with the service they received?
- have our resources been properly managed?
- did we meet our planned aims?

Looked at in this way we can be proud of our achievements in 1997/8. In spite of the extra work and anxiety caused by the 'merger', we provided 'service as usual' to our members as well as initiating some important development work.

## The Merger

On 1st April 1997 the eight Trustees were faced with the following tasks:

- close down Glanford CVS.
- close down Scunthorpe CVS.
- renegotiate pay and conditions of service for transferring staff.
- deal with redundancies.
- obtain charitable status for Voluntary Action.
- transfer leases, contracts and property.
- develop an accounting system.
- apply for funding.
- create a new staffing structure.
- advertise and fill vacancies.
- set up a service in the Isle of Axholme.
- re-open the Winterton service.
- hold elections for a new Board of Trustees.

All involved are proud that by super-human effort, in the face of unfilled vacancies, the most urgent tasks were completed by the time the new Trustees took office in October.

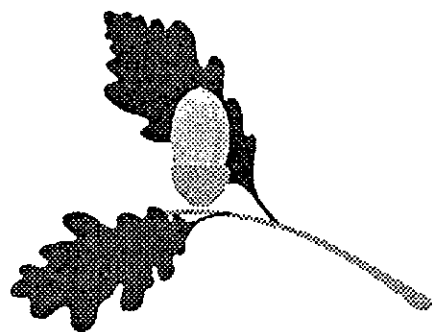
## Basic Services

By the end of the year we had two full-time and six part-time staff and were providing services from bases in:

- 647** items of desk top publishing or printing work were completed for **140** of our member groups.
- 30** groups used the *Funderfinder* program.
- 49** individual volunteers were interviewed and offered placements.
- 2,600** (approximately) general enquiries were dealt with: 6% of these developed into more complex pieces of work.
- 4** Voluntary Action newsletters were published.
- 7** information leaflets were produced.
- 3 new** information leaflets were produced.
- 12** up-dated issues of the *Self-help Diary* were published in the *Scunthorpe Evening Telegraph*.

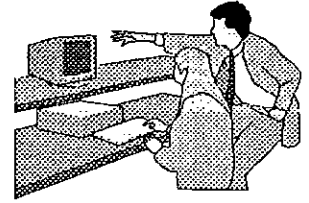


**New services** requested by members were:

## Training

One of our purposes is the advancement of education. This is a particular problem in rural areas where the time and cost of travel to training venues is high.



**38 people from 16 organisations** attended a series of three capacity-building seminars on the theme of Local Partnerships and European Funding. Speakers were from Voluntary Organisations Network for European Funding (VONEF) and North Lincolnshire Council.

**10 Volunteers** received professional training to drive our Community Minibus.

**13 Workers** from voluntary organisations attended two sessions on Personal Safety.

**52 people from 29 organisations** attended seminars at Barton and Scunthorpe on applying to the National Lottery Charities Board for grants.

We intend to examine ways of providing more learning experiences for groups in the rural areas.

# achievements



**Voluntary Action** has taken part in the following Partnerships:

## Partnership Working

An important part of our role is the encouragement of co-operative or partnership working and we also try to represent voluntary and community interests in forums and network groups. This can involve circulating consultation documents for statutory organisations, formulating responses, attending conferences, joining working parties and other such activities that draw people together.

This year we convened and ran a consultation exercise around the Local Authority Draft Strategy for Older People. The Director of Voluntary Action was a member of the Community Care Plan Editorial Board. Voluntary Action took responsibility for collecting the information on provision from voluntary sector organisations and then took part in the initial consultation exercise.

We also took part in the Joint Working Structure at Joint Services Group and Joint Care Commissioning Group levels.

We have also had to take part in initial discussion on the *New Deal* employment scheme.

# New Developments

**The accommodation at 41 Frances Street** has been rearranged to provide a **small ground-floor meeting room**. Some small improvements to access for people with disabilities have also been made.

The room has been well used by a variety of groups and has been particularly useful for groups wishing to carry out recruitment interviews. We have provided a reception service for these groups.

## ***Cancer Support Group***

We worked with the staff from Scunthorpe Hospital and the Rotary Club to set up a new support group for Cancer sufferers and their families. The initial meeting at the Wortley House Hotel was very well attended and a group of volunteers agreed to form a committee; the group is now meeting regularly.

## ***Voluntary Fair at Winterton***

The Winterton office was closed for five months after the merger until we were able to recruit more staff. To relaunch the service, allow local groups to network, raise funds and to recruit volunteers, a Voluntary Fair was organised at the Old School Hall. The Fair was very well attended and did a great deal to publicise the need for and the worth of volunteering and community activity.

## ***Voluntary Voice***

In March we held a meeting to launch a new organisation, *Voluntary Voice*. The aim of this organisation is to provide regular opportunities for workers in the larger voluntary organisations to network and to have speakers on major new initiatives, e.g. *New Deal*. The organisation will be looking for funds from outside the area and looks to increase the voluntary sector's capacity and professionalism.

## ***ISLE OF AXHOLME SERVICE***

In September 1997 Alyson Linnegar was recruited to work for ten hours a week to develop a service for the Isle of Axholme. She is available at the Local Link in Crowle from 10.00 to 12.00 on Fridays and on Mondays from 10.00 to 12.00 in St. Andrew's Church Office, Epworth. The remaining six hours a week are used to plan events and outreach work with local groups.

Working with the Youth Service an inter-agency group of statutory and voluntary organisations has been set up and two network meetings have taken place. Thirty organisations and individuals have expressed an interest in attending. These meetings have mainly been used for sharing news on current work in the Isle and individual organisations have given presentations on their work. The group has also agreed to publish a "Who's Who in the Isle of Axholme". Alyson will co-ordinate the collation of information and South Axholme School pupils will assist with the artwork.

Alyson has been actively involved with several groups in the Crowle and Ealand Regeneration Group, Epworth Regeneration Group, the Isle of Axholme Early Years Forum and the Crowle Lights Committee. Advice has been given on funding applications to Haxey Playing Fields and on publicity to AVID (a local dance group). Jointly with Humber and Wolds Rural Community Council advice was given to the group looking to develop a Millennium Wood in Crowle. Support in looking for volunteers has been given to several organisations. The search for volunteers in the Isle is continuing.

Alyson has also attended the Rural Development Programme Community Development Working Group and the Crowle Resider Project Group.

We feel this initial phase of development in the Isle has gone very well.

# Special Projects

## *The South Bank Forum*

Voluntary Action runs the South Bank Forum on behalf of the Joint Working Structure. The Forum was established to promote and enable the participation of voluntary organisations in North and North East Lincolnshire working in the fields of health and social care in the Joint Working process.

Funding for the Forum was due to end on 30th September 1997 but reduced funding for the second half of the year was agreed (to provide seven hours per week support) which allowed the Forum to meet quarterly and for briefing sessions for Joint Consultative Council representatives to be held regularly.

In response to the reduction in service to the Forum, a Management Group was formed to look at other funding possibilities and agree a constitution.

In the first half of the year all Forum Members were surveyed on their views about the role and development of the Forum. The full and positive response was most helpful and some of the suggestions have already been incorporated.

The Director of Community Services of South Humber Health Authority joined Forum members at their September meeting to present and discuss the Authority's proposals for Change in the Commissioning and Providing of Local Health Services.

The year concluded with confirmation from Joint Consultative Council that funding to the Forum will continue at the reduced level during 1998/9.

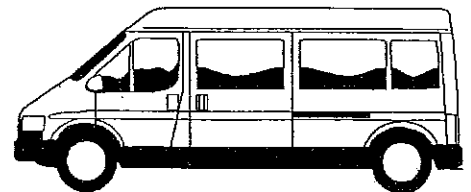
## *Community Mini-Bus*

We continued to look after the Community Mini-bus which is adapted for wheelchair use. The bus may be used by groups in membership provided it is driven by a driver who has attended and passed one of our training courses.

**Ten new drivers** were trained this year and new publicity was devised in an attempt to increase the usage. A grant towards the cost of Driver Training was gratefully received from Catwalkers.

We are particularly grateful to Mr. Tony Harrison, without whose voluntary help we would have great difficulty keeping the mini-bus on the road.

## *Community Opportunities*

This project is funded by Humberside Training and Enterprise Council and assists people to increase their self-confidence and employability through volunteer placements.

**Forty-two people** were helped by the scheme in 1997/8. Funding has been agreed for the year 1998/9 but the viability of the scheme may be affected by the *New Deal* employment scheme, which will have a voluntary sector option for 18 - 24 year olds. Numbers will be kept under review.

# Apna Sahara Service

The aim of the Apna Sahara service is to improve access for people from ethnic minorities to public services, particularly health and social services.

Apna Sahara means 'Our Support' in Urdu. The service employs Outreach Workers from the local ethnic minority communities who act as befrienders, advocates and interpreters. The team of outreach workers speak Bengali, Urdu, Punjabi, Pushtu and Hindi.

As well as individual assistance to clients the team provides training for service providers to help them in their understanding of the culture and religions of people from ethnic minorities.

A funding cut in this financial year required a one-third cut in staff hours, which meant some difficult adjustments for them and their clients but the change was handled very well and the staff are to be congratulated.

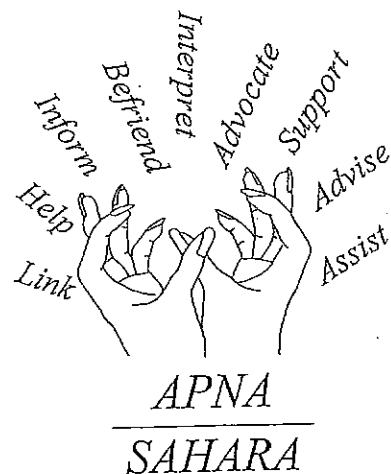
The service is unique (as far as we are aware) and attracts interest and enquiries from all over the country.

There are new requests to assist people from the local minority communities arising daily. The team organises various activities, both cultural and educational, for the local South Asian community. The community have taken a great interest in the information passed verbally and directly to them. When information is circulated in written form, even in the appropriate language, it fails to have the same impact.

The network of people involved with Apna Sahara is expanding all the time and has enabled the passing on of information on mental health, *Care in the Community* and *Health of the Nation* targets.

The service has been involved in, and worked closely with the Healthy Crosby initiative and Active Lifestyles in Crosby, both Single Regeneration Budget funded projects.

Apna Sahara has expanded its translation service with the help of software provided by the South Humber Health Authority. They are approached not just to arrange translations but also for advice on what is appropriate to translate and into what languages.



This has been a year of development and change for Apna Sahara and of continuous anxiety about future funding. However, by March 1998 we heard that funding for the year 1998/9 would be at the same level, which was a great relief.

The project is funded through Joint Finance, South Humber Health and North Lincolnshire Council Social Services.

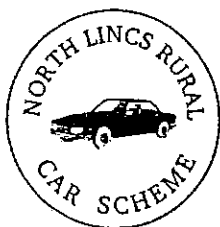

# North Lincolnshire Rural Community Transport



Voluntary Action (and its predecessor Glanford CVS) have now run this project for three years. The scheme provides individual transport for people who cannot use public transport through a team of sixty volunteers using their own cars. The volunteers cover the whole of the parished area of North Lincolnshire. Most of the trips are needed to provide access to health and social welfare services plus trips which enable frail elderly people to remain part of their local community.

In this, its third year, the scheme also provided a minibus service with an adapted vehicle rented from another charity.

An indication of how the scheme has grown can be given by comparing the number of return trips provided in a busy month.

- October 1995: 32
- October 1996: 150
- October 1997: 360

The three years' full funding for the project provided by Joint Finance ended on 31st March 1998 and will now be reduced on a tapering basis for three years.

In order to allow this excellent scheme to develop its full potential and seek funding elsewhere it was decided that it should become an independent charity from 1st April 1998.

Funding to cover the 33% shortfall for 1998/9 has been found thanks to a Charitable Trust, North Lincolnshire Council and the Parish Councils. We wish the new organisation well in its busy future and thank the marvellous staff for their work over the last three years.

# Financial Affairs

In the twelve months to 31/3/98 our total income from external sources was £227,975. Our thanks go to North Lincolnshire Council, South Humber Health and Humberside Training and Enterprise Council, our main funders. Other funding came from the sale of our administration services, use of transport, membership fees, rent, interest and donations. We would also like to thank our main funders for agreed, continued funding for 1998/99.

There was a total excess of income over expenditure of £15,741, which includes restricted funds. Provision has been made for a one-off repayment of the core grant funding to North Lincolnshire Council, caused by delays in staff appointments in the first six months of the financial year, whilst various expansions of services into the community started.

At the end of the year the North Lincolnshire Rural Community Transport project became a registered charity in its own right. From 1/4/98 assets held by Voluntary Action North Lincolnshire have been transferred to them. We wish them all the best for the future.

Computer systems have been enhanced by new hardware and software. This will be a continuous programme as funds become available. We have our own payroll system

and the latest accounting program. As with all developments training has also been an ongoing requirement.

The merger of the two councils for voluntary service has been completed to the satisfaction of the Charity Commission with changes made to administration systems to bring all into line. This work was facilitated by a grant from the Baring Foundation.


