

Voluntary Action North Lincolnshire is a charitable company governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association adopted on 19th March 1997. The date of incorporation was 1st April 1997. Voluntary Action North Lincolnshire's purposes are the advancement of education, the protection of health and the relief of poverty, distress, and sickness. These aims are pursued by bringing together voluntary and statutory organisations in Council and by encouraging co-operation between organisations.

The policy and general management of the affairs of **Voluntary Action** are directed by a Board of Trustees. The members of the Board of Trustees are directors of the company and elected to serve for three years or are co-opted annually.

Our Aims and Purposes

Voluntary Action North Lincolnshire can be described as an umbrella organisation or a local development agency. Our mission statement is:

Promoting, developing and supporting voluntary activity within the community.

Our community covers the whole of North Lincolnshire.

The charitable purposes of our organisation (advancement of education, protection of health and relief of poverty, distress and sickness) are carried out in a particular way. We aim to bring together organisations that share our purposes and encourage co-operation and partnership to achieve those purposes.

There are three themes to our general activity:

- **Service Provision** Voluntary and community groups are offered office services, use of rooms and equipment, advice on charity, organisation and funding matters, an information service, training, and regular newsletters.
- **Liaison and Representation** Voluntary organisations and their representatives are supported and encouraged to take part in consultations and service planning exercises with other statutory and voluntary agencies.
- **Development** We help new groups to start up in response to perceived need: we also assess need and, when no other appropriate organisation is available, set up pilot projects.

Access to Services

Our equal opportunities policy was reviewed and updated during the autumn of 1998. Part of the policy is to develop an understanding of disability issues and all staff, together with some Board Members, had training in *An Introduction to Disability* followed by a session of *Deaf Awareness*. One result of this training has been to open a Typetalk Account which staff have found easy to use.

To help rural groups to access our services we have part-time bases in Epworth, Crowle, Brigg, and Winterton as well as two full-time offices in Barton and Scunthorpe. We are also happy to visit groups or answer queries by phone or letter.

Progress

The Board of Trustees of **Voluntary Action North Lincolnshire** is satisfied that in our second year of operation, 1998-99,

- our work reflected our aims
- our resources were well-managed
- members were satisfied with the services they received
- a balance was achieved between core service provision and new development.

The present government has set a challenging agenda for change and names the voluntary and community sectors as partners in the process. We have been able to respond to the challenge by taking on two innovative partnership projects. Those projects, **Connexions - Barton** and **Crosby 21** are reviewed on pages five and six of this report.

Core Services and Membership

Membership numbers have remained high at 220 groups.

Our most regularly used services remain:

- desk-top publishing
- printing
- equipment loan
- minibus hire

- volunteer placement
- funding advice
- advice on constitutions and charity organisation

To support these services we purchased:

- additional display boards
- laminator
- scanner
- comb-binding equipment
- camera

and

A growing number of requests were received for assistance relating to legislation on employment and Health and Safety.

We were delighted with the results of a membership satisfaction survey in which our staff were awarded maximum marks for their helpful friendly attitude and for the quality of their work.

As a result of this survey we are planning to purchase a portable hearing loop system for the equipment loan pool.

Discontinued Services

The last year of operation for two services was 1998-99.

Community Opportunities: a volunteer placement scheme funded by Humberside TEC has been superseded by *New Deal*. Our Resource Workers will still try to place volunteers.

The South Bank Forum: funding from Joint Finance ceased on 31 March 1999. It will be replaced by a North Lincolnshire Joint Working Forum of Voluntary Organisations.

Community Transport Minibus

The minibus is adapted to carry wheelchairs and is in regular use. We are grateful to Dixons for continuing garage facilities at their premises, and to the Advisory Group of volunteer drivers who give us vital help in overcoming technical problems.

New safety legislation required us to renew the seats prior to the minibus' vehicle test in June 1999. A grant of £2,068 from the National Lottery Safer Minibus Programme made this possible.

New Services

Two further grants were applied for during 1998-9. Both were to the National Lottery Charities Board and both were successful.

A Funding Advice Worker, Brian Morris, has been appointed on a three-year contract. He will work across North Lincolnshire and can be contacted through any of our offices. Brian will give in-depth assistance to individual groups and organise training sessions.



A Voluntary Sector Legal Advice Worker, Graham Nicholson, starts work across the whole South Bank in July 1999. He will be based in Grimsby but has a generous travel budget. Details of how to obtain access to this service will be published in due course.



Achievements

Connexions - Barton

October 1998 saw the start of the **Connexions** project. Funded by the Single Regeneration Budget, North Lincolnshire Council Social Services Directorate, and Voluntary Action North Lincolnshire (in kind) **Connexions** forms part of the Barton-upon-Humber Regeneration Scheme. Although Social Services are the legally responsible body they have passed the management of the project to Voluntary Action while still taking a lively interest in the work.

The name **Connexions** reflects the idea that vulnerable people can best be supported by forging links between:

- individuals and organisations providing the help they need
- individuals and existing groups
- a variety of groups and services in Barton.

Connexions aims to:

- develop the capacity of the town to support and integrate vulnerable residents
- improve life quality and support independence
- address issues of social isolation
- improve home security for those who feel at risk
- develop a range of community initiatives that will lead to a safer, sounder, and more supportive environment.

In its first six months the project has:

- completed a community audit
- produced two information booklets

- introduced a Door & Window Lock Scheme
- set up a Home Maintenance & Gardening Scheme
- launched a Confidential Support and Friendly Visiting Scheme
- run an Anti-Bullying Project
- planned a Spring Voluntary Fair.

All the above work has been in partnership with or linked to other projects, services, or voluntary groups.

Connexions has already had a greater impact than expected. This is due to dedicated, enthusiastic staff, support from local people and the creative use of existing resources.

Crosby 21

Crosby 21 went live on 2 August 1998 and will run until 31 March 2001. The project officially 'belongs' to North Lincolnshire Council who with Yorkshire Arts and the European Development Fund provide the money. Management of the project has been delegated to Voluntary Action North Lincolnshire who provide this service as 'in kind' funding of the work.



The Celebrating Crosby Mosaic

Under the European Objective 2, Priority 5 theme *Helping Communities to Help Themselves*, the project has completed its first phase - the production of a local residents' Action Plan for Crosby and a Community Skills Audit. The credibility of the action plan is supported because the three core staff are Crosby residents.

The core team of three part-time staff are supported by an Arts Co-ordinator and a Community Work Coach who have taught the team how to involve the community through initiatives which are arts-based and encourage participation.

Examples of some participation exercises have been:

- **Wishes with Stitches** - a textile project by women from South-East Asian backgrounds.
- **Destination Crosby** - reminiscences from older men who arrived in Crosby from all over the world.
- **Today and Tomorrow** - a ceramic map researched and designed by local children.
- **Rhythm and Views** - a workshop for teenagers who were helped to write and perform songs which were recorded on a CD (see cover).
- **Celebrating Crosby** - a mosaic made by the Crosby Carers' Group which is intended for permanent public display.

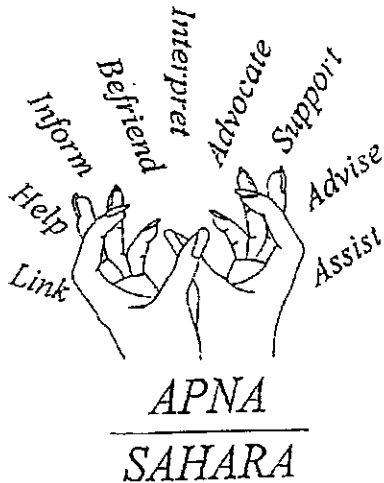

Apna Sahara Service



The aim of **Apna Sahara** (which means *Our Support* in Urdu) is to improve access to public services for people from ethnic minority communities.

Access is affected by language, culture, and custom. **Apna Sahara** staff, who are speakers of Bengali, Urdu, Pushtu, Punjabi and Hindi, assist people to cross these barriers. They act as befrienders, advocates, and interpreters to individuals and provide training and advice to service providers.

During the financial year 1998-99 funding was at the same reduced level as in 1997-98 leaving the staff on rather tight hours. However, despite uncertainty about the 1999-2000 income, a detailed review of the structure and development of the service was carried out by its Advisory Group. The resulting development proposals were accepted with enthusiasm by the Board of Voluntary Action and by the Apna Sahara staff.

The proposed changes (more responsibility for staff and a pro-active programme of work) was due to start on 1 April 1999 but it was in the year under review that the preparations were made. In addition to normal caseloads and training for service providers, the staff were trained to make funding applications for the new work and think through their new roles.

The period under review was exciting although the results of all the work will not emerge until 1999-2000. The staff have responded to the challenge like true entrepreneurs. They are:

The Future

The Board of Trustees have agreed that during the financial year 1999-2000 they will seek funding for at least two pieces of new work:

- **Community Connexions - Isle of Axholme** is planned to replicate the work of Connexions - Barton in a rural area with a dispersed population. If funding bids are successful our partners will be Social Services and the Rural Development Programme.
- **Community Arts Development Service.** The use of a participative arts approach by Crosby 21 has involved a wide cross-section of local people. We will seek funding so that this approach can be developed more widely.

We also plan to review our team work skills, our use of information technology, and the way we publicise the organisation and its services.

Financial Affairs

In the twelve months to 31 March 1999 our total income from external sources was £277,643. Our thanks go to North Lincolnshire Council, South Humber Health Authority and Humberside TEC, who are our main funders; this total includes SRB and ERDF allocations. Other funding came from the sale of our administrative services, use of the minibus, membership fees, rent, interest, and donations. We would also like to thank our main funders for early agreement on continued funding for 1999-2000.


There was a total excess of income over expenditure of £19,797 (which includes restricted funds) a breakdown of which can be found in the statement of financial activities in the annual accounts. With the addition of new projects being managed by **Voluntary Action North Lincolnshire** the year has been one of change and amendment. To facilitate these developments the coding for the computer accounting system has been completely revamped to provide more meaningful management information. Familiarisation sessions have been organised to assist your directors in interpretation of the accounts so that they can better fulfil their role.

My work has been helped by the staff in the changes necessary to provide monthly information on a full accruals accounting methodology which is a requirement of the Charity Commission.

Computer systems continue to be upgraded with both the 'Millennium Bug' and obsolescence in mind. Training is therefore still an ongoing requirement, especially as we are looking at going onto the Worldwide Web.

Voluntary Action North Lincolnshire are also grateful to Susan Webster of Cooke, Webster, & Co., who has been available throughout the year to answer queries on both legal and technical problems.



The full annual accounts were approved on 16 August 1999 and will be submitted to the Charities Commission. Abbreviated accounts will be submitted to the Registrar of Companies.



Report of the Auditor to the Directors of
